- Engage with national youth work, education and employment stakeholders to ensure that Open Badges are recognised and valued within the country.
- Involve aligning badge criteria with national educational standards or industry-specific competencies.



INCLUSIVITY AND ACCESSIBILITY:



- Ensure that the badge system is accessible.
- Leverage local languages, cultural contexts, and digital infrastructures.
- Digital skills development as a complementary process towards acceptance of Open badges




INTEGRATION WITH NATIONAL VALIDATION TOOLS:



- Aligning the open badge system with existing national qualification frameworks
- Ensure consistency and mutual recognition of learning achievements across different platforms.



FLEXIBILITY TO NATIONAL NEEDS:



- The badge systems should be adaptable to the specific needs and priorities of the country:
 - addressing specific issues in youth work or employment, promoting certain industries or addressing national skill gaps.



FEEDBACK AND CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT



- Regularly gather feedback from badge earners, educators, employers, and other stakeholders to refine and improve the badge systems in place.
- Keep the system relevant and effective in the face of changing national priorities or challenges.
